

Welcome to Arabic Studies!

Major Overview:

A BA in Arabic studies is offered through the Department of Classical and Near Eastern Studies (CNES), which is home to four major tracks, of which Arabic studies is one:

1. Arabic studies, focusing on Arabic language and literature as a gateway to the culture and civilization of the Arabic-speaking world
2. Classical civilization, focusing on the ancient Greek, Roman and Mediterranean worlds, broadly defined (no required coursework in ancient Greek or Latin language)
3. Classics, Greek and Latin, focusing on either ancient Greek or Latin language/literature, but requiring some additional coursework in the other language
4. Latin, focusing on Latin language and literature

The Arabic studies major entails 10 courses, of which six must be in Modern Standard Arabic and two in Egyptian Arabic. The remaining two courses are electives to be chosen in consultation with the CNES undergraduate director; options include advanced Arabic language or literature courses.

Courses:

Courses in Arabic language and literature (ARAB course code). Arabic studies majors are advised to begin the Arabic language sequence no later than fall of their sophomore year.

- TURK 111, 112, 203, 204, Modern Turkish Sequence
- TURK 480A: Ottoman Turkish
- ARAB 380B: The Postcolonial Arabic Novel
- ARAB 380C: Conversation, Grammar, Translation
- ARAB 385A: Introduction to Qur'anic Arabic

Majors in Arabic studies find that the major pairs well with the study of history, business, banking, economics, philosophy, pre-law, medicine, art history, comparative literature, political science, anthropology, Africana studies, and Judaic studies. More broadly, Binghamton University believes that a degree in the humanities, including Arabic studies, offers an enlightening perspective on today's headline issues and supplies the intellectual tools needed to address those issues. Indeed, this major is excellent preparation for a PhD program, depending on what you wish to pursue.
